

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#### KWAT: Focus Areas of our Humanitarian Aid and Assistance

## BACKGROUND

Since Burma achieved independence in 1948, fighting has never fully stopped in its many ethnic states including in the areas of Kachin and Northern Shan. Kachin and other ethnic nationalities' claims for equal political rights was ignored by consecutive Myanmar leaders in power. The period of much celebrated democratic transition was also characterized by top-down political system where marginalized ethnic, religious and other minority communities continued to be excluded from decision making.

The offensive war launched by the Burmese Military has cost the Kachin community unknown number of innocent lives. Displacement caused by the war and land grabs by private businesses with close ties to those in power has robbed the future of tens of thousands of our children.

The impact of protracted intergenerational displacement is manifested in drug addiction, and loss of educational opportunities for our young generation - our future leaders.

Kachin state rich with natural resources, extraction of resources largely by the military affiliated private companies and people in power has led to forced land acquisitions, environmental degradation, and human rights violations.

Lack of peace and stability has been a primary push factor causing many Kachin to migrate to and seek refuge in foreign countries including to Thailand. The number of Kachin migrants to Thailand has increased every year, with women outnumbering men. Kachin migrants in Thailand have faced many hardships in terms of safety, shelter, job opportunities, and access to education, with women experiencing particular hardship, and requiring specific support.

KWAT's initiatives since 1999, has helped address the suffering and hardship of the Kachin people of Northern Myanmar as well as in neighboring Thailand. By providing these essential services including humanitarian support, empowerment programs and raise awareness on human rights and political issues, KWAT is now being recognized as a key stakeholder in both the Kachin community, and civil society organizations within the region.

Vision: The Kachin Women's Association Thailand envisions a peaceful and developed society, rooted in gender and social equality, free of discrimination and oppression.

Mission: The Kachin Women's Association Thailand is a non-profit organization which works to eliminate discrimination and violence against women. It does so, by enhancing the living standards of women, which enables them to participate in the decision-making processes at all levels, and strengthens the quest for social justice, peace, and development in the Kachin region.

# **OUR ACHIEVEMENTS**

#### **Anti-Trafficking Program**

A devastating outcome of the protracted conflict and displacement of people, has been the uncountable numbers of women trafficked as sex slaves into China from communities in the Kachin and Northern Shan States. This is the case for many Kachin women particularly under the age of 25 as they seek employment opportunities, primarily to support their parents and young siblings. While total numbers trafficked each years remain unknown, KWAT has been for the past twenty years working with authorities from both sides of the border in Myanmar and China, in rescuing survivors and providing psychological support as the survivors try and return some sense of normality to their lives.

Using the survivor-centered approach, KWAT provides the following services: Safe houses (shelter), Emergency Support including short-term and long-term Mental Health and Psychological support, legal support, consultation, livelihood support, survivors empowerment and capacity building, and community outreach. These KWAT led initiatives endeavor to prevent further human trafficking, and reducing stigmatization of the survivors within the community. In the last 3 years, KWAT has successfully implemented the following programme's.

485 survivors of human trafficking have received support such as shelter, food, transportation, MHPSS, Psycho-Social Support and livelihood.

6639 local people have received awareness-raising training on human trafficking and safe migration practices.




331 local people have participated on 'Stop VAW' day events, the 16 Day 'Awareness Raising Campaign' and 'International Obverse events days.



## **Participant Feedback**

"There are huge obstacles in the rural areas and China-border areas. Since our village is located around the Burma-China Border, some parents want their daughters to marry Chinese men through cultural relations. It happens to almost every house, so it is a challenge for us to prevent forced marriage in our areas."

"Owing to the Gender Based Violence and paralegal awareness raising training provided by KWAT, I have been able to use these knowledge and skills within my family and community. I learned extremely important emergency response such as getting medical attention for a victim of sexual violence within 72 hours to prevent an unwanted pregnancy. These are extremely useful for my community and also how I work with those in power around these issues."



### **Political Empowerment Program**

R ecognizing the urgent need to nurture and support our future leaders, KWAT has been conducting 'Political Empowerment Programme's' for women and youth from Kachin and Northern Shan states for the past 10 years. KWAT's aim is to strengthen local communities through political awareness, so they can protect and lead their own communities. As a result of this program, which has focused on equipping participants with political knowledge and respecting and protecting the basic rights of all, in line with our feminist values and principles. Many graduates have become leading human and women rights activists at both a local and international level. The following are examples, of what KWAT has achieved over the last three years.



One Day Women Exchange, 2021

Conducted 86 consultation meeting's held with community leaders.

Youth Exchange on Politics were held with 362 future leaders.

**E**vent Days: IWD and VAW Day events were held with more than 450 people attending.

Information seminars on the current political situation, were held with 138 youths, women, and community leaders.

#### **Documentation and Research Program**

As a researched-based organization, our Documentation and Research Program is the foundation for collecting and analyzing human rights violations taking place across Kachin communities. This program has enabled us to undertake evidence-based advocacy, and more importantly organizing immediate support for survivors and their family members, who have been injured and or traumatized by the abuse they have suffered. The support includes creating safe spaces and platforms for the survivors to speak the truth, and to connect with others who have gone through similar experiences.

In the last 3 years, KWAT has been successful in achieving our goals by providing the following services:



Below graph shows human rights violation (HRV) cases that KWAT has collected in 2019, 2020 and 2021. These HRV cases have happened in Kachin and Northern Shan state. According to the graph, KWAT has collected total 60 cases in 2019, 55 in 2020 and 97 in 2021. Types of cases that KWAT has collected includes lootings, freedom of religious, extortion, torture and ill-treatment, rape, sexual abuse, killing, forced labor/Porter, arbitrary arrest and detention, disappearances, land confiscation/destruction of culture and property, the right to freedom of assembly and other cases.

### **Health Program**

WAT's health program workers have been working around the clock to meet the needs of disadvantaged communities for more than ten years. There are many areas of Kachin and Northern Shan states, that the Central authority has never managed to control historically, but which has been administered by Kachin Independence Organization. KWAT's health program was initiated in 2003, and after 2011 and the resumption of civil war that the requirement for greater health care forced KWAT into expanding health care services further across Kachin and Northern Shan States, in areas inaccessible or unattended by the KIO or Central government. The situation became especially urgent, after the Central authority ordered international non-profit organizations to evacuate from Kachin-controlled territory. As the war intensified, KWAT has become the sole and essential health service provider to many communities, including those residing in Internally Displaced Camps. Today, more than 20,000 people, mostly women and children, rely on KWAT's health services which continues to expand.

KWAT administers three clinics in the Mai Ja Yang and Loi Je-Seng Ja IDP Camps in Kachin State, and also in Kut Kai, Northern Shan State. By providing general medical treatment, maternal and child health care, laboratory services, and school health services including adolescent reproductive health training across 60 schools. Thus, KWAT staff are providing a wide range of essential services to villagers, particularly those residng in remote areas.

KWAT also collects family planning data in targeted villages and camps annually, to identify high healthrisk situations. For example, since 2021, KWAT has been working in these districts for two reasons. First, to strengthen the local health system; second, to promote health awareness and provide basic treatment, especially in Maternal and Child Health treatment. Although it may be said, educating the parents of teenagers about reproductive health has been a challenge, it can also an opportunity. Our campaign is often met with skepticism or perceived as encouraging early sexual activity among the youth by local residents. However, KWAT's programs have worked effectively in raising awareness of teenage pregnancies, and the risks involved of terminating and the very real possibility of serious medical complications as a result of a termination.

Being a respected women's organization and service provider for the Kachin community, we are fortunate to be in a situation we have been given the opportunity to engage the community who trust us with their care. We do so with, warmth, patience, and cultural sensitivity. We are changing the hearts and minds of parents and leaders, and confident we are changing the way the Kachin community looks at sex education. Not as a taboo subject, but as a positive demonstration of how informed family planning advice can lead to positive outcomes. During the past three years KWAT has completed the following :


Trained 20 community Health Workers from rural communities.

#### **Income Generation Project**

A s of 1999, KWAT's income generation project, based mainly in Chiang Mai, Thailand, offers vocational training to Kachin women who have been recently rescued from trafficking. The participants make these products by hand, and KWAT markets them. This program provides these women with an opportunity to earn their own independent income for themselves and their children, whilst fostering their self-confidence and self-esteem. They also make a valuable contribution towards the funding of a number of KWAT programs in both Thailand, and Kachin State. Profits from selling these products raise funds for female survivors of trafficking.


